It was Runnels to the rescue when the call for towels and blankets came from Friends of the Animals (FOTA) and the Companion Animal Alliance of Baton Rouge (CAA). Our Elementary Library, whose theme this year is "The Year of the Animal," quickly took action, sponsoring a "Warm Beds, Wagging Tails" Towel Drive for the animal shelter in December.

Within two weeks, our kindergarten through 6th grade students had donated 762 towels to the drive. On the afternoon of Dec. 19, Paula Schoen, president of FOTA and the interim president of the Companion Animal Alliance, visited our elementary campus to thank the students and faculty and let them know that all of those towels would be put to good use.

Speaking in Caroline Hader's 2nd grade classroom, Mrs. Schoen thanked the children: "Christmas is a time for giving, and you sure have."

She explained that the towels are used for bedding in the shelter and are

put to use in many important ways in the veterinary clinic. They become warm blankets for newborn puppies and kittens and are even turned into "hammocks" for some injured cats.

During her visit, Mrs. Schoen was pleased to announce that the students in grades 2 and 5 had contributed the largest number of towels to the drive and would be awarded giant Pixie Stix.

On behalf of FOTA, she accepted a \$300 donation that came from the "tip" jar at the wrapping paper table at the Runnels Visual and Performing Arts Showcase held at Barnes & Noble Dec. 7-9. Students, teachers, and alumni from Runnels clubs, classes, and organizations served as volunteer gift wrappers. 
The showcase began the evening of Dec. 7 with a reception in the Cafe' area to kick off the student art and photography exhibit, which remained on display through early January.





enough, but "it was constantly being revised by the composer during the filming."

Before she was hired, Isabelle had to sign a confidentiality agreement. "She was sworn to secrecy," Mrs. McCall explained, and the family would have to keep silent about the movie for quite a while, since the filming took place in November of 2011.

Isabelle's scene was filmed on a soundstage at the Celtic Media Centre in Baton Rouge, where the home of the Cullen clan had been reconstructed.

To make it appear as though Foy was playing the piano instead of Isabelle, part of the scene was shot from above, with Isabelle doing the playing by stretching her arms up from underneath the instrument.

You never see Isabelle's face, but you do see her hands flying across the keyboard.

Mrs. McCall said that Isabelle was on the set for three days doing "take

after take, with Robert Pattinson right next to her."

Isabelle added: "We were sitting at the piano in the living room (of the Cullen mansion) with all of the main characters around us."

She said that even though it took days to film her part in the movie, "there were only a few seconds of screen time. It was cool watching how the filming process works."

The 7th grader's reaction to working with superstar Pattinson: "He was

nice and friendly."

Judging from her response to meeting teen heart-throb Taylor Lautner, a werewolf in the series, it's probably fair to say that Isabelle is not exactly star struck. She met Lautner near the trailers at Celtic Studios, where he was walking a puppy he was babysitting for a friend.

"He was really nice," said Isabelle, "but the puppy was just adorable."

oped amazing superpowers, which he employs to rush to the rescue of dogs facing imminent danger.

Ripley to the Rescue, which has a very happy ending, comes in a boxed kit with a seven-inch plush toy of the canine superhero.

Though this is Mrs. Randall's fifth children's book, it's the first one she's written. She illustrated *The Texas State Bird Pageant*, *A Place Called Morning*, and *Makin' Groceries: A New Orleans Tribute* which were written by Louisiana author Todd-Michael St. Pierre. She also illustrated *Through the Window*, written by Assistant Head of School and Preschool and Elementary Principal Gladys Runnels.

In addition to teaching at Runnels and writing and illustrating books, Mrs. Randall is a professional artist and the chief costume designer for the precision lawn mower drill team known as the Krewe of Yazoo, which regularly marches in the Spanish Town Mardi Gras Parade.

The book talk also served as the kick off event for the elementary library's hugely successful "Warm Beds, Wagging Tails" Towel Drive (See story on first page).
